



Abridged version of Project Plan: Research Project to inform the APPG Inclusive Entrepreneurship Inquiry 'Road to Wonder'

Introduction

Innovate UK has agreed to sponsor a Research Project which has now been commissioned and is a collaboration with Innovation Caucus and CIMR Birkbeck University of London. The Secretariat will provide Project Lead (Universal Inclusion), alongside Helen Lawton Smith from Birkbeck CIMR as Lead Researcher (supported by the various research, practitioner, policy makers and tiers within the project implementation).

This project builds on earlier research in particular the Innovate UK project undertaken by the Innovation Caucus (2019) and Lawton Smith's subsequent study funded by the Regional Studies Association (2020-2021), Addressing regional inequalities in innovation opportunities for BAME and disabled groups. Both projects provided excellent evidence and insights. They also have mapped the landscape of support for disabled entrepreneurs and innovators. We now know much more about the number and kinds of organisations that have an interest in overcoming barriers to inclusive innovation.

Research that underpins this project includes published work by co-applicants (Rolle, Kisato, Rock and Winstanley 2020) and Seyyide and Lawton Smith (2022)¹. Both have highlighted a growing academic and grey literature on innovation, entrepreneurship and disability. For example, Winstanley's paper highlighted the specific challenges faced by people with disabilities in becoming entrepreneurs. Seyyide and Lawton Smith's report provide provided a detailed analysis of the geography of networks that support BAME and Disabled entrepreneurs and to position the analysis within the context of UK and international policy agenda and actions. Both, however, drew attention to the need to update the literature of both kinds of publication in the light of further studies.

The proposed study, therefore, will examine the traditional the who, the what, the why, the where and the when. It will provide a strong evidence base relating to issues relating to barriers to innovation and enterprise faced by disabled people. It will also provide fresh insights into the nature and scope of innovation within this sector. From the evidence, the project will do four things.

A key theme in this project is to identify societal as well as economic value in supporting disabled people in being innovative entrepreneurs. It will also identify areas of policy that are not currently being covered and how they could operate at the regional level. It will provide recommendations on how actual and potential disabled entrepreneurs can be supported and upscaled thus contributing to inclusive economic growth. On this basis of what is found, a future study could usefully identify additional policy areas relating to intersectionality, health & wellbeing contribution to inclusive economic growth beyond turnover reducing the disability employment gap.
